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School Recycling Award Winners Announced at Earth Day Festival



This year, seven West County schools received a total of \$8,000 for their recycling and waste reduction efforts.

The top winner was Middle College High School. MCHS's Recycling Committee runs the recycling in twelve buildings of the Contra Costa Community College campus, where MCHS is located. The Recycling Committee plans to apply the award money toward organizing a creek clean-up day and starting organics recycling and composting.

Another winning school, Juan Crespi Middle, recycles cell phones, batteries, and printer cartridges, in addition to the materials recyclable in the blue carts. Pinole Valley High School also set up used battery collection on their campus, and collected old eyeglasses for reuse through a local charity.

The other winners were Adams Middle School, Coronado Elementary, Highland Elementary, and Valley View Elementary. Read about Valley View Elementary's award-winning recycling program on page 2.

Student involvement and leadership, combined with a dedicated teacher to oversee the students, have proved successful in each school.

Spotlight on Valley View

Valley View Elementary School, a first-time School Recycling Contest winner, received \$700 for its achievements in recycling and waste diversion.

Valley View has been recycling for several years, but recently, the Student Council voted to oversee the recycling efforts at the school. Getting the staff, administration, custodians, and students on the same page has invigorated the program. Teacher and Recycling Coordinator Harold Crawford calls Student Council President, 6th grader Kevin Ward, "the driving force behind the recycling effort."

The Student Council chose first to target the waste generated during lunch. As in many West County schools, lunches come packaged on cardboard trays, which can be recycled. Student Council members agreed to volunteer their lunch periods to assist other students with placing cardboard trays and other recyclable items in the blue recycling carts, while making sure other waste is disposed of in the garbage can.

Thanks to these students' efforts, the custodian has already noted that the amount of garbage generated at lunch has decreased from 8 or 9 bags to 3 or 4 bags per day!

Valley View hopes to expand its lunchtime recycling program to include aluminum lunch trays. They also plan to mount an education campaign throughout the school to inform all students and teachers about what should be recycled. Some of the award money will go toward improving the composting in the school's garden. Kudos to Valley View - we look forward to your future successes!

FIVE WAYS TO REDUCE END-OF-THE-YEAR WASTE AT SCHOOL



- 1 Recycle all paper items that cannot be reused. Recycle all other acceptable materials, too!
- 2 Organize a mini-yard sale of unclaimed lost and found items, or donate them to a local charity!
- 3 Collect your unwanted school supplies for donation to a local charity.
- 4 Donate books to book drives such as Children's Book Project or Books for the Barrios.
- 5 If you need extra recycling pick-ups, call Chuck Paradis at Richmond Sanitary Service, (510) 231-1621.

Do You Want to Have a School Garden Next Year?

Plan ahead...It's easy as 1-2-3!

- 1** Pick a spot for your garden and develop a preliminary planting plan. Start clearing away debris and amending the soil with compost (see Step 3).
- 2** Apply for a **RecycleMore mini-grant** as early in the schoolyear as possible. Don't wait until the spring - it takes 4 to 8 weeks to process an application. Fall is an excellent time to start preparing your soil for planting in the spring.
- 3** Call us at 215-3021 to schedule a **free composting class** and receive a free compost bin for your school. We can train students, teachers, and parents to compost yard trimmings and food scraps, recycling nutrients and creating a wonderful soil amendment!
