This policy requires staff to purchase Recycled-Content Paper Products and Recycled-Content Printing and Writing Paper that consists of at least thirty percent (30%) recycle content whenever the total cost is the same cost, lesser cost or not more than 10% of the non-recycled content alternative. The City's janitorial services contract includes requirements for recycled-content paper. The City purchases 30% and 100% recycled paper from Staples. City department staff that are responsible for landscaping maintenance, renovation, construction, or related activity are to prioritize the use of Compost and Mulch produced from recovered Organic Waste for landscaping maintenance, renovation, or construction. Effective January 2025, the City banned single-use plastic bags and foodware at retail and food businesses with a requirement to use recycled-content paper bags and compostable foodware as well as a good-faith effort to prioritize reusables where feasible. Free technical assistance is being offered to all businesses. The City has also received SB1383 local assistance funds which helped equip all facilities with three-stream receptacles for easier collection of organic waste. The City also procured some outdoor receptacles with three-stream collection to increase organic waste diversion as well as accomodate proper collection due to ordinance requirements to use compostable foodware when renting City facilities. The City will also be using funds for compost giveaways, chip and grind operations, and community education to decrease contamination rates. b) San Pablo San Pablo is purchasing the following recycled content products: 30 and 100% post-consumer copy paper, remanufactured toner cartridges, rulers, envelopes, file folders, trex decking at the corp. yard, refillable pens, TDA, recycled-content road base, printing educational outreach material on recycled-content paper. San Pablo has updated its procurement policy to be compliant with SB 1383 procurement requirements. c) El Cerrito purchases the following recycled content products: copy paper (100% post-consumer by Environmental Services Division and 30% post-consumer by other divisions), business cards, educational print material, file folders, envelopes, and either recycled-content or refillable pens. Many divisions procure rechargeable batteries, compostable cu</p>

Staff provides agenda items electronically to the City Clerk, who in turn makes the items available in electronic form for staff and the public. The City Council members sometimes prefer hard copy; however, the items are printed on recycled content paper. In addition, the City accepts plans and permit applications electronically. The City will be using CalRecycle Beverage Container Recycling funds to install water refill stations at City Hall and Pinole Senior Center to eliminate the need for water delivery. The City also updated its Procurement Policy which now includes an Environmentally Prefereable Purchasing Policy and Program. A purchasing guide will be circulated to staff and a training is scheduled for September 2025. b) San Pablo: The City has centralized recycling containers for single-stream recycling within and around its City office for employees to use. In addition, the City of San Pablo has recycling containers in the main break rooms and customized beverage recycling containers outside to prevent theft for employees and the public to use. The City has placed these customized beverage recycling containers throughout the City. In total, the City estimates it has placed about 134 of these customized beverage recycling containers aroud the City, including most of its parks. c) El Cerrito: The City implements the following source reduction practices: setting double-sided copies as the default for printers and within employees' computer settings; using reusable cups/plates in many of the break rooms; having an office trading area for reusing supplies; donating, selling, or giving away surplus property prior to recycling and/or landfilling the material; providing agenda items electronically to the City Clerk, who in turn makes the items available in electronic form for staff and the public. The City Council members sometimes prefer hard copy; however, the items are printed on recycled content paper. In 2017 the City moved to electronic filing of timecards. In 2021, the City has also moved to accept a large number of plans and permit applications electronically. d) Richmond: The City implements the following source reduction practices: paperless procurement process, switched to posting all financial documents online, duplex printing, elect</p>

In addition, the City of San Pablo has recycling containers in the main break rooms and customized beverage recycling containers outside to prevent theft for employees and the public to use. The City has placed these customized beverage recycling containers throughout the City. In total, the City estimates it has placed about 121 of these customized beverage recycling containers, including most of its parks. b) El Cerrito: The City implements a three stream program within its City offices. Desk-side and centralized recycling containers are available for employees to place material into the proper bin for recycling, organics, or garbage. The City of El Cerrito makes recycling available at parks, along the Ohlone Greenway and at all street litter cans. Lastly, the City started a three-stream program at the El Cerrito Community Center for the conference center and main hall for recycling, organics, and garbage. The City plans on rolling out a similar program to club house facilities. Material generated from City parks, City buildings, public works, the recycling and environmental resource center is sorted at the tipping pad at the El Cerrito Recycling Center. Employees source separate material at the tipping pad into roll off dumpsters for garbage, organics, and street sweeping. Recyclables are source separated at the El Cerrito Recycling Center. The City uses on-site mulching for its landscaping and parks. When the City conducts its large-scale tree trimming, it makes wood chips generated from this available to the public. c) Richmond: The City makes desk-side and centralized single-stream recycling containers and instructional posters available for employees to use at city facilities. The City educates its 750 employees about the diversion and EPP programs available by posting the programs on its website. Additionally, HR onboarding staff give recycling education brochures to new staff. The vendors utilized by the City denote recycled-content products on-line and within its catalog. This makes purchasing recycled-content products easy for the purchasers within each of the City's departments. In 2019, the City partnered with an office supply vendor to educate staff on the recently adopted foodware amendment and SB1383 procurement requirements. d) Pinole: City employees have desk-side and centralize</p>

a) Pinole: All city facility greenwaste is back-hauled to an organics bin at the City Corp Yard. Chipped green waste is stockpiled at the City Corp Yard and applied at parks and other landscaped areas, as needed. With the new foodware ordinance, all City facilities are equipped with higher volume three-stream receptacles in addition to compost pails. Senior Center receptacles have the highest volume receptacles due to daily lunches that are provided. b) San Pablo: The City has small organic containers for food scraps in the break areas and larger 23-gallon slim jims within the larger break rooms for City employees to use within the City Corp. Yard, Senior Center, Community Center, and Police Department. The new City Hall has centralized 23-gallon containers in each department as well as in break rooms and kitchens. The City of San Pablo is direct hauling its green waste and trash generated within its Corp. Yard in separate vehicles. c) El Cerrito: The City implements a three-stream program within its City offices. Desk-side and centralized containers area available for employees to place materials into the proper bin for recycling, organics, or garbage. The City uses on-site mulching for its landscaping and parks. When the City conducts its large-scale tree trimming, it makes wood chips available to the public. The City also implements three-stream collection at the City's annual 4th of July festival and requires foodware from vendors to be compostable in line with the City's Foodware Ordinance. d) Richmond: Centralized organics containers (food, food scraps, and green waste) are available for employees at the Civic Center and community centers. Employees are properly utilizing the organics containers within the office area. In addition, the City places centralized recycling posters within office area and above recycling/organics containers to educate employees. e) Hercules: The City grasscycles in its parks, encompasses some on-site management of green waste by chipping green waste and using mulch within City parks and other landscaped areas, and has three roll-off green waste bins at its corporation yard for City employees and its contractors.

This policy requires staff to purchase Recycled-Content Paper Products and Recycled- Content Printing and Writing Paper that consists of at least thirty percent (30%) recycle content whenever the total cost is the same cost, lesser cost or not more than 10% of the non-recycled content alternative. The City's janitorial services contract includes requirements for recycled-content paper. The City purchases 30% and 100% recycled paper from Staples. City department staff that are responsible for landscaping maintenance, renovation, construction, or related activity are to prioritize the use of Compost and Mulch produced from recovered Organic Waste for landscaping maintenance, renovation, or construction. Effective January 2025, the City banned single-use plastic bags and foodware at retail and food businesses with a requirement to use recycled-content paper bags and compostable foodware as well as a good-faith effort to prioritize reusables where feasible. Free technical assistance is being offered to all businesses. The City has also received SB1383 local assistance funds which helped equip all facilities with three-stream receptacles for easier collection of organic waste. The City also procured some outdoor receptacles with three-stream collection to increase organic waste diversion as well as accomodate proper collection due to ordinance requirements to use compostable foodware when renting City facilities. The City will also be using funds for compost giveaways, chip and grind operations, and community education to decrease contamination rates. b) San Pablo San Pablo is purchasing the following recycled content products: 30 and 100% post-consumer copy paper, remanufactured toner cartridges, rulers, envelopes, file folders, trex decking at the corp. yard, refillable pens, TDA, recycled-content road base, printing educational outreach material on recycled-content paper. San Pablo has updated its procurement policy to be compliant with SB 1383 procurement requirements. c) El Cerrito purchases the following recycled content products: copy paper (100% post-consumer by Environmental Services Division and 30% post-consumer by other divisions), business cards, educational print material, file folders, envelopes, and either recycled-content or refillable pens. Many divisions procure rechargeable batteries, compostable cups, plates, and utensils. El Cerrito updated the City's procurement policy and procedures to ensure compliance with SB1383 procurement requirements. The City also completed an Expanded Food Ware Ordinance that prohibits the use of single-use plastic food ware items at restaurants and city facilities and additionally incorporated the requirements of AB 1276 requiring foodware to be provided ONLY upon request of the consumer. d) Richmond adopted an EPP in 2009. Richmond is purchasing the following recycled-content products: 30% and above post-consumer copy paper, remanufactured toner cartridges, file folders, and envelopes. In addition, the following recycled- content products were utilized within the LEED gold certified Civic Center: steel, ceiling tile, and carpet. In 2018 Richmond expanded its Food Ware ordinance to include the ban of plastic straws and stirrers. Departments can only purchase food ware that is reusable, recyclable or compostable. Departments cannot procure plastic straws or stirrers. Additionally, Richmond generates its own wood chips/mulch from regular park and tree maintenance. The amount generated covers a majority of the City's landscaping needs. In addition, free compost was provided for residents to pick-up at various community events. e) Hercules purchases the following recycled content products: 30% post-consumer copy paper, recycled content janitorial products (toilet paper and paper towels), file folders, envelopes, recycled content park benches. a) Pinole: The City practices the following source reduction programs: double-sided coping copying option, reusable cups, plates, and utensils in its break room, electronic time sheets and grasscycling. Staff provides agenda items electronically to the City Clerk, who in turn makes the items available in electronic form for staff and the public. The City Council members sometimes prefer hard copy; however, the items are printed on recycled content paper. In addition, the City accepts plans and permit applications electronically. The City will be using CalRecycle Beverage Container Recycling funds to install water refill stations at City Hall and Pinole Senior Center to eliminate the need for water delivery. The City also updated its Procurement Policy which now includes an Environmentally Preferable Purchasing Policy and Program. A purchasing guide will be circulated to staff and a training is scheduled for September 2025. b) San Pablo: The City has centralized recycling containers for single-stream recycling within and around its City office for employees to use. In addition, the City of San Pablo has recycling containers in the main break rooms and customized beverage recycling containers outside to prevent theft for employees and the public to use. The City has placed these customized beverage recycling containers throughout the City. In total, the City estimates it has placed about 134 of these customized beverage recycling containers around the City, including most of its parks. c) El Cerrito: The City implements the following source reduction practices: setting double-sided copies as the default for printers and within employees' computer settings; using reusable cups/plates in many of the break rooms; having an office trading area for reusing supplies; donating, selling, or giving away surplus property prior to recycling and/or landfilling the material; providing agenda items electronically to the City Clerk, who in turn makes the items available in electronic form for staff and the public. The City Council members sometimes prefer hard copy; however, the items are printed on recycled content paper. In 2017 the City moved to electronic filing of timecards. In 2021, the City has also moved to accept a large number of plans and permit applications electronically. d) Richmond: The City implements the following source reduction practices: paperless procurement process, switched to posting all financial documents online, duplex printing, electronic timesheets and direct deposit notifications, replaced desktop printers/scanners/fax machines with multifunction devices, using reusable cups, plates, and utensils in the City's break rooms, using a reusable office supply trading area, and providing iPads to City Council members and managers. Richmond distributes reusable shopping bags and straws at events. e) Hercules: he City implements the following source reduction practices: setting its copiers and printers to double-sided copies as the default, reusing single-sided copies as scratch paper, switching to electronic timesheets, reusing envelopes, having a designated re-use area for office supplies, using reusable cups in the office, and switching to electronic agenda items with the Council Members using lap tops and requiring Council Members and/or executive staff to request hard copy. Hercules distributes reusable shopping bags at events.

a) San Pablo: The City has centralized recycling containers for single-stream recycling within and around its City office for employees to use. In addition, the City of San Pablo has recycling containers in the main break rooms and customized beverage recycling containers outside to prevent theft for employees and the public to use. The City has placed these customized beverage recycling containers throughout the City. In total, the City estimates it has placed about 121 of these customized beverage recycling containers, including most of its parks. b) El Cerrito: The City implements a three stream program within its City offices. Desk-side and centralized recycling containers are available for employees to place material into the proper bin for recycling, organics, or garbage. The City of El Cerrito makes recycling available at parks, along the Ohlone Greenway and at all street litter cans. Lastly, the City started a three-stream program at the El Cerrito Community Center for the conference center and main hall for recycling, organics, and garbage. The City plans on rolling out a similar program to club house facilities. Material generated from City parks, City buildings, public works, the recycling and environmental resource center is sorted at the tipping pad at the El Cerrito Recycling Center. Employees source separate material at the tipping pad into roll off dumpsters for garbage, organics, and street sweeping. Recyclables are source separated at the El Cerrito Recycling Center. The City uses on-site mulching for its landscaping and parks. When the City conducts its large-scale tree trimming, it makes wood chips generated from this available to the public. c) Richmond: The City makes desk-side and centralized single-stream recycling containers and instructional posters available for employees to use at city facilities. The City educates its 750 employees about the diversion and EPP programs available by posting the programs on its website. Additionally, HR onboarding staff give recycling education brochures to new staff. The vendors utilized by the City denote recycled-content products on-line and within its catalog. This makes purchasing recycled-content products easy for the purchasers within each of the City's departments. In 2019, the City partnered with an office supply vendor to educate staff on the recently adopted foodware amendment and SB 1383 procurement requirements. d) Pinole: City employees have desk-side and centralized single-stream recycling containers located through its offices. Single-stream recycling containers are also placed within City Hall, Senior Center, Corp. Yard, Fernandez Park, Pinole Youth Center, Police Department and Fire Station. Break rooms are equipped with three-stream receptacles as well as compost pails. For large events, the City places a request with Republic Services to drop-off and pick-up three-stream totes before and after the event. The totes are dropped off to a secure location so illegal dumping does not occur prior to the event.
